- *1. Make a large (poster-size) map of Maryland. Include Routes 50, 95, 695, 495, 270, neighboring states, county boundaries, bodies of water, Bay Bridge, Baltimore, Hagerstown, Annapolis and Ocean City.

Add to you map places your troop visits or discusses while working on the patch.

2. Maryland has many fine state parks. Identify 3 of them, their location and their facilities. Visit one of them.
3. Most states have a state flag, bird, tree, flower, song, and colors. Find out what Maryland's are and what their significance is.
4. Take a walking tour of Annapolis or another historic town in Maryland.
- *5. Visit a county other than the one you live in. Learn something new about that part of our state.
6. Maryland's government is elected by the adult residents. Arrange to meet one of our elected officials: Governor, Senator, Representative, Mayor, Councilman, etc.
7. Find out something Maryland is well known for. How does this affect the people that live there?
8. Because the Chesapeake Bay divides Maryland into two different and distinct parts, find out about the people who live on the other side of the bay and the type of life they lead.
9. Water plays an important part in Maryland. Find out what type of jobs people in Maryland have that pertain to the water.
10. The border between Maryland and Pennsylvania is a very exact straight line and has a very special name. Find out what the line is called and why it came into existence.
11. Since 1845, Annapolis has been the home of the U.S. Naval Academy. Find out about the Academy and why it has such significance in the United States.
12. Many people who live in Maryland were not born here. Find out where the members of your troop and their families were born, and, if they are from another state, find out why they now live here.
13. Visit a Wildlife Refuge and find out why they are located where they are.
